
Richard Tucker shares his vision for the future sustainability of the Canadian Canoe Museum at PHS Public Meeting September 16th

Richard Tucker, Executive Director of the Canadian Canoe Museum will be guest speaker at the at the PHS monthly Public Meeting on September 16th. Since he took on the job late last spring, Richard has been busy developing a strategy for the future of the museum.

He notes that until recently, the primary means of understanding culture and history was to visit museums to view artifacts or obtain books at libraries. Now with the internet, images, videos, learned interpretations and books from all over the world are instantly delivered to your laptop or tablet.

"A key driver of museum attendance has in the course of a single decade become permanently redundant. For museums in general, and historical and cultural museums in particular, there are increasingly serious challenges with attendance, relevancy and sustainable financial models. Yet, we innately know that there is more to culture and history than what is delivered over the internet. The seeing or handling of an artifact that is hundred's of thousands of years old engenders a compelling

curiosity."

Remember When – Vernon Goselin

My interview with Vernon Gosselin was prompted by a discussion with Elaine Gosselin, long time member of the Society, regarding the city's Crescent Street study. Elaine pointed out historically there was a strong French community residing there and that Vernon Gosselin, a relative, was still living in the family home on Crescent St.

Vernon was born in Peterborough in 1928. Vernon's grandfather worked for Macdonald's saw mill on Little Lake and took an active part in the community, serving as School Trustee on the Catholic Board which brought the nuns at St. Joseph's to Peterborough. He retained his French language which he needed to communicate with the nuns.

Vernon operated a butcher shop at the corner of George and Sherbrooke. His three uncles - Frank, Joe and Leo - worked at the Ackerman's harness factory for \$5 a week. Vernon attended Sacred Heart School and started work at CGE in 1946. He had many memories of the numerous French families living in the area - the Letelliers, Paquettes , Odettes and the LePlantes. Mr. Baptiste Odette operated a boat building plant on Little Lake.

Vernon recalled the importance of Little Lake in his youth – swimming in the summer, skating in the winter. He remembered soldiers marching along Crescent Street from the Basic Training Camp at Morrow Park during World War II. His memories, photos and family connections are a living witness to the strong French community in Peterborough, a history that deserves to be documented and celebrated.
