Blair MacKenzie to give presentation on the Fairbairn family of Peterborough on Wednesday September 21 at the Parlour, Trinity United Church



Often we pay little heed to the names of streets we cross each day. Our speaker for September's talk will take us through the history of the Fairbairn family and its connection to Peterborough and Stoney Lake.

Blair Mackenzie, a Fairbairn descendent, and his wife, Kathleen, retired to Lakefield a few years ago and have become members of the Peterborough Symphony, both playing the viola. Blair spent thirty-five years practicing law primarily as a general counsel in the Canadian newspaper and communications industry. He has also left a record of active community service as a volunteer.

A few years ago Blair unearthed a collection of glass plate negatives which represent a fascinating view of summer life more than a hundred years ago. He and Kathleen are active in the preservation of nearby lakes and shorelines, as well as of their history. Blair will discuss the interesting three men who came to own Juniper Island which is the king-pin of all the activity that spread out around Stoney Lake. The Fairbairn family is a major part of this history.

ALL ABOARD FOR BOBCAYGEON **Mossom Boyd "LUMBER KING OF THE KAWARTHAS**

The Peterborough Historical Society annual bus tour will visit the historic community of Bobcaygeon. The home of the first lock on the Trent-Severn Waterway and residence of Mossom Boyd, the Lumber King of the Kawarthas along with site of Settlers Village and the recently acquired property of the Kawartha Land Trust, Boyd Island – it has much to offer our members. The tour will take place Wednesday 28 September. A coach will meet at the Riverview Park and Zoo parking lot at 8:30 (free parking available) and travel to Bobcaygeon for a tour of Settlers Village where a lunch will be served. After lunch, there are optional tours of either the Boyd Heritage Museum or a trip out to explore Boyd Island. On the return trip to Peterborough, we will stop at the Kawartha Winery for free tasting and tour of the wine making facilities before arriving at the Riverview parking lot around 5:15 The cost is \$60 per ticket which includes lunch and all admissions. The trip promises to be an informative



and enjoyable outing and may, if the weather co-operates, feature the fall splendor of colour. Space is limited. Tickets must be purchased in advance at the PHS office (order at (705) 740-2600), and can be picked up at Hutchison House, 270 Brock Street.

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June tour at Peterborough Museum and Archives

The monthly meeting of the PHS in June took place at the Peterborough Museum and Archives, following which Jon Oldham of the PMA explained the history, planning and extent of the new PMA expansion and renovations. The original building, a centennial project of 1967, very soon underwent its first expansion from 1977 to 1979 to provide space for its growing archival collection. By the 1990s even this space was proving inadequate to accommodate acquisitions over the next two decades, including important collections, among which the Roy Studio photographs, the Legion collection, and the Civic Hospital collection. Between 2009 and 2012 the museum undertook several upgrades that improved accessibility, modernized systems, replaced the roof, and renewed the landscaping. By then, the crisis of space, which endangered the conservation of artefacts and documents, could no longer be ignored, and the City approved the recent expansion and renovations. The project involved the renovation of 3000 square feet on the lower level of the existing building, and the construction of a new building with storage and work space of 9000 square feet. The budget was \$3.3 million, of which the City provided \$2.8 million and Heritage Canada \$380,000. The local firms of Lett Architects and Mortlock Construction undertook the work, with p2i Strategies of Milton managing the project. Following his talk Jon Oldham, assisted by Allison Hayes and Susan McBride, led a tour of the stunning new facilities. The City has provided an essential resource for the community, ensuring the preservation and conservation of, and effective access to, the cultural and historical records by which we may all be educated better about our past.
