

As I sit and write this report, we are less than a week away from Christmas and less than two weeks away from our first in-person Hogmanay since January 2020. I want to thank all the museum volunteers who have been helping with baking, Scotch Eggs and the prep and execution of this event, as well as all of the great community volunteers such as Barry Landry, Doug Keene, Justine Landry, Nick Lasch, The Hasty P's Pipe Band, Breanne Mansfield and the Ard-Mohr School of Dance for their time and expertise in bringing this event to life once again. It would not have been possible without all your help. A special thank you to the UK Shoppe here in Peterborough on George St for donating our Haggis this year. We are grateful to community partners such as the UK Shoppe for their generosity and support.

If you haven't had your fill of delicious Scottish Treats from Hogmanay, the Museum will offer a Robbie Burns Day meal you can pre-order and take home on January 25, 2024. The first Burns supper was held in Ayrshire, Scotland, in 1801 to celebrate the life of Scotland's National Poet Robert Burns. Robbie Burns Day is considered a key cultural heritage event in Scotland. Celebrate this Scottish icon with a traditional Scottish meal made up of all your Hogmanay favourites. You must pre-order your meals by January 19, 2024. Meals will be available for curbside pick-up between 12 PM and 2 PM on January 25, 2024. Meals are \$30 and will include: a Scotch egg, tatters and neeps, oatcakes, cheese, a sample of potted salmon, shortbread and cloutie dumpling. For an extra \$5, you can also get a piece of Haggis.

**Tickets on sale now for the Trent Valley Archives Theatre's new play,
Tide of Hope, coming to Market Hall on May 16, 2024**

[Tickets are on sale now](#) for the Trent Valley Archives' new fundraising and educational theatre initiative, *Tide of Hope*, written by Peterborough playwright Ed Schroeter. The play, a prequel to the Peter Robinson immigration story, is geared to the general public and students in Grades 6 to 12.

Tide of Hope follows David Nagle, an Irish land agent and rent collector who must flee to Upper Canada with the Peter Robinson settlers of 1825 to escape the wrath of Irish rebels fighting against English tyranny. The play commemorates the bicentennial of the Peter Robinson immigration while opening a dialogue about immigration, refugees, migrants, and European settler history.

There will be a public performance of the play at 7:30 in the evening on May 16, 2024. Tickets for this performance are \$30 per person for regular seating or \$40 per person for table seating. There is only one public performance being offered, so we highly recommend that you purchase your tickets before they're gone! There will also be two performances for school groups at Market Hall on Wednesday, May 15 at 10am and 1pm.
