



"The Right Thing to Do"

Once an aspiring history teacher, Ken Doherty's interest in local history lured him into a 38-year career in municipal government. He started as Curator then became Director/ Curator of the Timmins Museum: National Exhibition Centre. In 1988, he moved south to become the Director of the Peterborough Centennial Museum & Archives. While there, he served as President of the Ontario Museum Association. Ken was also the co-founder and long-serving faculty in Fleming's Museum Management & Curatorship Program.





Ken hasn't really retired. He has a consulting business and is currently Board Chair at Showplace. For fun, he appraises firearms and is a regular contributor to **Ontario Out of Doors**.

Throughout his career, Ken has worked closely with Indigenous organizations and First Nations to earn their trust on numerous collaborative projects. Ken will share his thoughts on "the right thing to do" in terms of Indigenous relations. He will outline the Peterborough Precedent, in which the Peterborough Centennial Museum & Archives repatriated skeletal remains from its collection to the Curve Lake First Nations in 1991.

Then he'll share some of the Museum's subsequent significant repatriation initiatives and exhibits, and other City and County collaborative ventures with local First Nations. He will provide some timely insights on Truth and Reconciliation. And Ken promises to challenge the Peterborough Historical Society and its members to take action on Indigenous relations.



From the President

It always surprises me when I hear visitors to Hutchison House and the Peterborough Museum & Archives, or participants on the various walking tours I lead, make the comment "I didn't know Peterborough had so much history!" My surprise likely comes from my three-decade immersion in the people, events, and buildings of this community.



The richness and scope of Peterborough's past, and the many fascinating characters it has produced, has been reinforced over the past four years because of an interest project I began during the COVID lockdown in 2020: an illustrated "Dictionary of Peterborough Biography". Using published and unpublished material, Ancestry.ca, cemetery lists, military records, Peterborough directories, photograph collections, newspapers, and anything else I can get my historical paws on, I am compiling short biographies of Peterborough men and women whom I find interesting and/or significant into an alphabetical document -- perhaps a book, fingers crossed.

Some of those included had exciting lives before they came here – several veterans of the Napoleonic Wars/War of 1812 settled in the area after their military careers – while others were born here and went off into the worlds of business, politics, medicine, sports, the military, science, etc. Did you know that one Peterborough mayor spent several of his young adult years as the founder/operator of a factory making whale-oil containers in Valparaiso, Chile? (I didn't!) I am trying to include not just community "bigshots", but also "average Joes" and "average Janes" who have made community contributions that may not be as well known. The latter is more difficult and usually requires some extra "digging" into records.

I may or may not ever finish this task – researching each person's story is not always straightforward (Ancestry.ca has taken me down some strange and deep rabbit-holes!), and can lead to new inclusions – but it has already been a fun and enlightening exercise. For anyone, researching historical interests can be a great way to learn about the history of their community, province, or country, and about those people who made them what they are today. Why not give it a shot?
